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21 **MINUTES REVIEW AND APPROVAL**

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23 Minutes of the July 11, 2017 Parks and Recreation Committee meeting were reviewed.  
24 Melissa Larsen made a **motion** to approve the minutes as written. Brian Curnow seconded the  
25 motion, which was passed by unanimous vote (4-0).  
26

27 **NEW MEMBER**

28  
29 Leslie Flowers was welcomed as a new member of the Parks and Recreation Committee.  
30

31 **REPORT ON MOVIES IN THE PARK**

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33 Chair Keddington reported the movie Sing was cancelled due to wind. It will be  
34 rescheduled for next year. The Star Wars movie was well attended, considering it was the same  
35 night as the Bountiful fireworks display.  
36

37 **REPORT ON COMMUNITY PARK EXPANSION PROGRESS**

38  
39 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, displayed a map showing the progress of the  
40 Community Park expansion. There are now an additional 128 parking stalls on the west side by  
41 the Frontage Road. A new asphalt walking path has been added that connects to the current walking  
42 path. The circumference of the entire paved walking path is one mile.  
43

44 At 7:05 p.m., Kelli Hintze arrived at the meeting.

1 The new water pump system has been completed for the irrigation water. All of the  
2 irrigation, top soil, top grading, and landscaping will be added next year. Football games start this  
3 coming Saturday, and the sidewalks have been repaired, and trees that have died or are mostly  
4 dead have been cut down and the most of the stumps will be ground out. A few of the stumps will  
5 be carved into native animals. The Tingey family has donated \$50,000 for the construction of the  
6 pavilion on the new park expansion of Community Park.  
7

8 Leslie Flowers asked if there is a charge for use of the fields. Mr. Cox explained there is a  
9 fee for the use of the fields, but the baseball coordinators volunteer their time. There is not a profit  
10 for the City on youth sports. The UTE Conference Football runs the football program, and the City  
11 only has to provide the fields. Brian Curnow said the purpose of the baseball program is to have  
12 equally matched teams, so that one team is not winning all of the games. Brian Curnow explained  
13 most of the boys who are in baseball are under eight years of age. After that, the boys are usually  
14 placed in competition teams by their parents, which hurts the City baseball program.  
15

16 **REPORT ON ISLAND VIEW PARK LWCF GRANT APPLICATION**  
17

18 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, reported Susan Zarekarizi, Utah State Parks &  
19 Recreation Department, has approved the Land Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Grant for the  
20 Island View Park. The grant request will be fully funded in the amount of \$650,000. The second  
21 phase of the grant application goes to the National Parks Service. Susan Zarwiski met with Steve  
22 Thacker, City Manager, and Bruce Cox to tour the park and view the boundaries. She inspects the  
23 park every year to make sure the park is continuing to serve and function as the grant intended,  
24 and not for other non-approved uses. The inspection showed no historic sites or environmental  
25 studies will need to be done for the new grant, because the same grant was given back in the 1970s,  
26 and the park has not changed. The concept plan for the park must be restudied to make sure the  
27 figures are correct for the money to be spent.  
28

29 Tamilyn Fillmore, City Council Liaison, reported the City Council has a desire to expand  
30 cemetery space. They see Island View Park as a possible location, and they want to talk about this  
31 before the grant is accepted. The City Council has also explored using the west property at the  
32 cemetery where it slopes down, and do retaining work to build it up for additional cemetery space.  
33 Mr. Cox explained Susan Zarwiski said before you spend money on purchasing new land, it will  
34 cost \$25,000 for the appraisal on the best use for the property. The National Parks Service would  
35 be opposed to converting existing park space into another use. The City would be labeled a "bad  
36 actor", which would make it difficult to receive future grant money. Councilmember Fillmore said  
37 an additional 1,000 spaces could be added to the cemetery if the retaining wall can be added, if  
38 double burials can take place, and if a mausoleum can be built. Mr. Cox said there currently are  
39 restrictions on purchasing cemetery plots, and only Centerville residents can purchase plots at this  
40 time.  
41

42 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, explained the City owns land on the mountain  
43 side that is not zoned for residential development. This could be a location for a cemetery, but the  
44 expensive part is building road access and providing irrigation water and sewer. The cemetery by  
45 the Bountiful LDS Temple is private owned by Lakeview Memorial Estates and they own five  
46 cemeteries.

1 Stan Engh, representative of Memorial Estates, has expressed interest to Bruce in developing  
2 another cemetery location in Davis County, knowing that Woods Cross, North Salt Lake, West  
3 Bountiful and Fruit Heights do not have cemeteries. The cemetery would be private but the City  
4 could negotiate benefits for city residents. There is some undeveloped land around Lund Lane, and  
5 one idea is that perhaps Farmington and Centerville cities could work together in facilitating the  
6 development of a private cemetery that would benefit both cities, as Farmington is also running  
7 out of cemetery space.

8  
9 The Parks and Recreation Committee agreed they do not want park space at Island View  
10 Park to be used for the cemetery expansion. As a result of that consensus, Councilmember Fillmore  
11 then suggested, if that is the desire of the Committee, they should write a letter to the City Council  
12 requesting the grant money be used for the park improvements, and that other options for the  
13 cemetery expansion be considered. Chair Keddington will write a letter to the City Council  
14 expressing the desire of the Parks and Recreation Committee that the Island View Park will be  
15 park space forever, and will not be used for cemetery expansion. The letter will include the  
16 potential of future grant money for future park improvements, that could be lost if Island View  
17 Park is converted into cemetery space. A work session will be scheduled with the City Council to  
18 discuss this recommendation.

19  
20 At 8:00 p.m., Leslie Flowers was excused from the meeting.

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22 **WETLANDS FOR FOOTBALL COURT**

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24 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, reported the City Engineer would need to meet  
25 with a wetland consultant, and make recommendations to give to the Army Corps of Engineers  
26 before anything can be done with the NW corner of the Community Park. This is the area that was  
27 the first choice for a Football court by RSL. The conceptual plan for the pond area on the east side  
28 of the Frontage Road, just South of Chase Lane, is to make a small nature park, but the pond must  
29 be cleaned first. One possible idea is that if this pond area is not already designated as a wetland  
30 then it could be made into one, in exchange for another area that is designated as a wetland. Mr.  
31 Cox will continue to follow up on this item.

32  
33 **OTHER BUSINESS**

34  
35 Chair Keddington asked if a report can be given each month on how much RAP Tax money  
36 is available, and what the park fund balance is. Mr. Cox said there is now an accounting firm that  
37 is providing these services for the City, and he will ask for this information to be provided at future  
38 meetings.

39  
40 Brian Curnow asked about the wetlands property on the hillside at 100 South and 800 East,  
41 and if the City is going to purchase this property. Councilmember Fillmore reported this is a flood  
42 control basin. The County is going to develop three lots on the south side of the property, and then  
43 deed the property on the north side to the City as flood control property.

44  
45 Melissa Larsen asked about the Smith Park. Councilmember Fillmore reported that  
46 William R. Smith donated half of the property in 1930 where Founders Park is located.


1 The property was named Founders Park, in 1989 when the City Council held a contest to rename  
2 the park, and it was changed, and the pioneer statue was added. William R. Smith's descendants  
3 have come to the City Council and requested the park be renamed, Smith Park. The family refused  
4 the idea of a plaque honoring William R. Smith, be placed at the park. There are family members  
5 who went to the current City Council, and they have agreed to rename the park to William R.  
6 Smith Park. It will be up to the Smith family to raise the funds for the park sign to be changed.


