26 **MINUTES REVIEW AND APPROVAL**

28 Minutes of the November 13, 2018 meeting minutes were reviewed. Jon Ruedas
29 made a **motion** to approve the minutes as written. Leslie Flowers seconded the motion, which was
30 passed by unanimous vote (4-0).

32 **PARKS MASTER PLAN UPDATE**

33
34 Chair Lynn Keddington reported the Parks Master Plan Survey is on the City website and
35 was inserted in the City mailer that was mailed last week. Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation
36 Director said 200 surveys have already been completed and returned. Mackenzie Wood will be
37 asked to verify that residents who requested notification to take the survey did, in fact, receive
38 their survey. Jon Ruedas shared the survey on Facebook, and Lynn Keddington will ask South
39 Davis Recreation Center to provide information about how many Centerville residents are
40 members, what recreation programs Centerville residents participate in and how many participate
41 in each program. The closing date for the surveys to be returned is January 31st.

43 At 7:15 p.m., Kelli Hintze arrived at the meeting.

1 **INTRODUCTION OF ISLAND VIEW PARK RENOVATION CONCEPT PLAN**
2

3 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, explained the timeline of the Island View Park
4 for the concept plan, overall plan, and the two option plans for the Island View Park. The reason
5 the Island Park Renovations were divided into two phases, is because if the grant was given in one
6 phase, it would have taken all of the grant money the State has, and the grant would probably have
7 been rejected. The playground area is the focus of this meeting, and to determine the amenities
8 that should be placed on it. On January 10th, there will be an open house at City Hall to receive
9 feedback from the citizens on what amenities they want on the playground.
10

11 Kelli Hintze asked if a water splash feature was considered similar to the new Mill Stream
12 Park in Bountiful. Mr. Cox explained there is not a water splash feature planned, but there will be
13 drinking fountains. Members of the Focus Group who were in attendance said the items listed as
14 priorities are shown on the Master Plan. Both tennis courts will be remodeled and have pickle ball
15 lines painted on them, so that they can be used as tennis and pickle ball courts. The courts, the
16 pavilion and parking areas will have lights, but not the playground area.

18 **ISLAND VIEW PARK PLAN DISCUSSION**
19

20 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, explained after the open house, the design group
21 will take the comments and make a final design to be given to the City Council for approval. Bids
22 for the construction will go to the contactors in February, and the bid will be awarded soon after
23 in March. It is hoped construction will begin in the spring as soon as the weather permits. It is
24 hoped Phase One can be completed by the end of 2019. One of the questions in the survey is if
25 citizens would approve bonding to complete Phase Two sooner, and repay the bond with RAP tax
26 revenue. Otherwise, it would take eight years to complete the park. One of the main issues is there
27 is currently only one restroom on the bottom level. Phase Two will construct a second restroom
28 on the top level. Kelli Hintze said the Focus Group has concerns about children running across the
29 lower parking lot to use the lower level restroom. Suggestion was made to install a four-foot fence
30 around the lower parking lot to prevent children from running through the parking lot.

32 Chelsea Astle, Focus Group, suggested having multisport courts by the tennis/pickle ball
33 courts. Soccer cages could be used to have more soccer areas, street hockey, and volleyball courts
34 that would not affect the tennis/pickle ball courts. Jennifer Turnblom discussed an email she
35 received expressing concern about the safety of children running on the trails who would not be
36 able to be seen from the open area. It was agreed it is not easy for adults to traverse the trails on
37 the steep slope, but the new design shows several sidewalks throughout the park that parents can
38 see their children. There have been concerns about the slope where the slides will be, but the design
39 team said it is not too steep of a slope and the slides should fit safely on the slope.

43 Leslie Flowers told the Parks and Recreation Committee she will be resigning from the
44 Committee due to family issues.

1 Kelli Hintze said she will contact Chuck Gillmore about music in the park for this summer. Bruce
2 Cox will be sending links to movie catalogs for Committee members to review for the Movies in
3 the Park this summer.


