20 **MINUTES REVIEW AND APPROVAL**

21
22 Minutes of the January 8, 2019 meeting were reviewed. Melissa Larsen made a **motion** to
23 approve the minutes as written. Kelli Hintze seconded the motion, which was passed by unanimous
24 vote (5-0).

25
26 **REPORT ON ISLAND VIEW RENOVATION OPEN HOUSE**

27
28 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, reported on the Island View Renovation Open
29 House, and reviewed some of the survey answers. Sand volleyball was the top choice for an
30 amenity near the lower playground. Most everyone is in favor of the new park and the renovations.
31 Design development drawings will be completed this Thursday, and the plans should be ready to
32 go out to bid by March 31st.

34 **PARKS MASTER PLAN UPDATE**

35
36 A. **Survey Results**

37 Chair Lynn Keddington reported Paul Stead does not have all of the survey results
38 compiled yet. Mr. Cox reported that there were 600 responses received by paper and
39 100 online. The Youth Council helped to enter the responses from about 300 of the
40 mailed surveys.

41
42 B. **SDRC Information**

43 There were 92,000 visits at the South Davis Recreation Center in 2018 from Centerville
44 residents. There are currently 1,787 passes issued to Centerville residents. The
45 breakdown of program participation at the South Davis Recreation Center was given.

1 Bruce Cox and Tiffany Rees explained they were working with the baseball program to
2 offer softball on a trial basis. There has not been much participation from Centerville girls
3 in the program offered by SDRC. Tamilyn Fillmore, City Council Liaison, explained if the
4 interest is to have more girls' softball teams to compete in this local area, she will take this
5 information to the SDRC meeting. The surrounding cities already have separate entities
6 that is not part of the SDRC. It was pointed out that the SDRC and the city leagues are
7 probably competing against each other for the same limited number of players and could
8 result in none of the leagues having enough teams to support good competition.
9

10 **DISCUSS MOVIE IN THE PARK DATES AND TITLES**

11
12 The Committee discussed movies they would like to show at the Movies in the Park this
13 summer. The movies the Committee agreed on are:

22 Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, will work on the dates for the movies to be
23 shown, and bring the list of dates to the next meeting.

25 **MUSIC IN THE PARK**

26
27 Kelli Hintze reported she called Chuck Gillmore to discuss if any of the contestants from
28 the Centerville's Got Talent contest would be willing to perform before the Movies in the Park.
29 He said he thought they would. Kelli will work with him when the movie dates are set to see if
30 they can schedule some of the performers.
31

32 **PROGRESS REPORT ON FUTSAL COURTS**

33
34 Chair Keddington reported that Jon Ruedas sent an update on the Futsal courts. The RSL
35 Foundation is still interested in constructing the courts, and they are looking for more sponsors.
36 Dell Loy Hansen, owner of RSL, will be meeting with potential sponsors on March 5th. He also
37 reported that they may be asking the City to provide some funds for the court – possibly up to
38 \$20,000.
39

40 Mr. Cox reported that Matt Layton recently received a sponsorship from Land O' Frost for
41 batting cages. He is hoping the City Council will match the donation. The RAP tax is tapped out
42 for this year, but a match could be budgeted in the July 1st budget for the next fiscal year, and the
43 City Council Contingency Fund may still have money left towards the end of this fiscal year that
44 could be a funding source.

1 **REPORT ON FITNESS COURT FUNDING**
2

3 Chair Keddington reported that he sent applications to IHC, Mountain American Credit
4 Union, and the Eccles Foundation requesting donations for the Fitness Court. The Eccles
5 Foundation is requesting a letter from Tamilyn Fillmore, Bruce Cox, and the head of the
6 Centerville Community Foundation on how the Fitness Court will benefit the community. The
7 second phase of the application process must be sent by March 15th.
8

9 **HILLSIDE PRIORITY USE RECOMMENDATIONS**
10

11 Mr. Cox reported there is a Task Group that has made recommendations for the hillside
12 that were sent by email to Parks and Recreation Committee members. Chair Keddington discussed
13 the abuse on the hillside where ATV's are not staying on the trails. The Committee reviewed the
14 use data collected, and it was pointed out that hiking, walking, and biking were combined into one
15 group, but motorcycles, ATV, Side by Side, and Jeeps were separated into different categories and
16 that make it appear that those activities are not a high use or priority.
17

18 The next step will be to form a Committee that will make recommendations for a Master
19 Plan for the hillside area. Councilwoman Fillmore read from the report of the Task Group that
20 supports low impact environmental uses such as additional hiking and biking trails, and mountain
21 biking trails would also be supported. The survey results indicate the primary activities on the
22 hillside are walking, running, and hiking. About half of the people completing the current hillside
23 uses survey were not Centerville residents. Thomas Hunt will serve on the Hillside Ad-hoc
24 Committee that is being formed to represent the Parks and Recreation Committee.
25

26 At 8:15 p.m., Melissa Larsen and Thomas Hunt were excused from the meeting.
27

28 **OTHER**
29

30 Chair Keddington reported his term on the Parks and Recreation Committee will be ending
31 this coming June, and he will not serve on the Committee after that time.


33 Mr. Cox asked Committee members to give ideas on how to encourage donations from
34 citizens for certain park amenities, similar to what the Tingey family did at the Community Park
35 with the new pavilion. Perhaps people could be encouraged to donate an amenity at a park, and
36 then the family name could be engraved on a plaque. Kelli Hintze suggested putting handprints of
37 donors on tile squares for a retaining wall, similar to what was done at a park in St. George. This
38 item will be discussed at the next meeting.


40 **NEXT MEETING**
